The Embodiment of Freedom: Sojourner Truth and Harriet Tubman

Wednesday, March 25, 2026, at 2:00 PM

The United States District Court, Bankruptcy Court, and Probation Office for the Southern District of Indiana and the Marion County Bar Association are excited to celebrate Women's History Month with a special event on **Wednesday, March 25, 2026, at 2:00 pm**. The hour-long program will be held in **Courtroom 307 at the Birch Bayh Federal Building and United States Courthouse, 46 East Ohio Street, Indianapolis, Indiana**. One hour of Continuing Legal Education credit is pending approval. Attendees are invited to enjoy a reception following the event.

Preceding a living history performance, Senior District Judge Jane E. Magnus-Stinson will provide an overview of the courageous battles of Sojourner Truth and Harriet Tubman. Both women were civil rights activists, abolitionists and suffragettes. Working within the legal system – Sojourner Truth secured the return of her illegally sold son through court proceedings – and outside of it – Tubman secured the freedom of many slaves through the Underground Railroad – the two women sparked lasting change in the acquisition of rights for women and Black Americans.

Donnice Robinson and Tracey Middlebrooks Wynn, co-founders of [Soulful Journeys of Women](#), will then bring Sojourner Truth and Harriet Tubman's experiences to life. Their performance will explore Truth and Tubman's strong social, political, and spiritual influences and their impact on communities throughout American history.

Ms. Robinson is a wife, mother, actress, teacher, minister, and entrepreneur. She has performed in numerous productions, appeared in local commercials and films, and trained under the cast director, Alpha Tyler, at Tyler Perry Studios in Atlanta, Georgia. Ms. Robinson portrayed characters for Freetown Village for over a decade and performed reenactments of Madam C.J. Walker's sales agent and jazz singer, Lizzie Washington, at the Indiana Historical Society. Ms. Robinson has also portrayed composite characters at Conner Prairie.

Ms. Wynn studied speech, communications, and theatre at Tennessee State University, and performance has always been a part of her life. While living in Brooklyn, New York, Ms. Wynn produced and directed a weekly television show for the Brooklyn Community Access Station (BCAT). The show, "Around Our Way," focused on the happenings in the Historical Fort Greene section of Brooklyn. Ms. Wynn's love of theatre and history has also allowed her to work with the Indiana Historical Society, where she portrayed the iconic Madam C.J. Walker, the first self-made female millionaire in America.

Ms. Robinson and Ms. Wynn's mission through Soulful Journeys of Women is to educate, inspire, and entertain by portraying the lives of strong women of color who persevered through many obstacles on their path to freedom and independence.
