



**For Immediate Release (September 2, 2014)**—Do you have an interest in history, the law, or civics? If so, consider traveling back in time with the Historical Society of the United States District Court for the Southern District of Indiana and the Indiana Historical Society (IHS) to learn about our state’s federal legal history. Beginning on Friday, August 29, the two organizations will present a new journey, “Indiana’s Federal Courts: A Legacy of Justice,” in IHS’s *Destination Indiana* exhibit.

*Destination Indiana* features a series of self-guided “time-travel” stations, using innovative technology, touch screens, and immersive images to educate guests about the historical significance of places, institutions, and people across the state. “Indiana’s Federal Courts: A Legacy of Justice” gives visitors to the Eugene and Marilyn Glick Indiana History Center the opportunity to trace the history of the federal judiciary in Indiana from its origin as a territorial court, to its rebirth as the District Court for the District of Indiana, to its 1928 division into the Northern and Southern Districts of Indiana. The journey also follows the Southern District of Indiana’s history right up to the present day, providing guests with facts, photos, and descriptions to broaden their understanding of the federal courts and their role in Indiana history.

“Indiana’s Federal Courts: A Legacy of Justice” was sponsored, researched, and written by the Historical Society of the United States District Court for the Southern District of Indiana, a non-profit organization committed to recovering, preserving and promoting the history and artifacts of the United States District Court for the Southern District of Indiana, and to educating the public about the role and function of the Court.
